Year 10 Careers Excursion & Career Aspirations Day

On Thursday 22 June Year 10 students travelled to Sydney Olympic Park to visit many of the one hundred and twenty exhibitors at the Western Sydney Careers Expo.

Students spent time walking through exhibitor stalls and speaking to various course providers about career paths and opportunities. Universities, TAFE, the Australian Defence Force and numerous private colleges representing the arts, music, information technology and hospitality industries were visited.

Students also had the opportunity to sit and listen to seminar talks including those given by the Universities Admissions Centre, the Mathematics Association of NSW and the Academy of Interactive Entertainment.

Following this excursion, on Friday 23 June the school held a Career Aspirations Day in the San Damiano Centre. The purpose of this day was to expand the thinking of the students about careers and career pathways. Students were divided into small groups and rotated between four presentations during the day. Australian Catholic University lecturers and current students led the presentations. Students gained information on Law, Nursing, Exercise and Health Science degrees, along with information on subject selection processes and universities.

Overall, both days were highly beneficial in providing relevant and timely information to the students that could be used to assist in their subject choices for Years 11 and 12.

From the Religious Education Coordinator

Pray with us through the Gospel of Matthew

The St Agnes Mission Goal for 2017 is: To develop a deeper knowledge of Jesus and his message of service through reading the gospel of Matthew. As a learning community, we have started to incorporate the gospel of Matthew as part of our daily prayer with a scripture focus for each week.

I'd like to invite you to join us in praying these scripture passages with us as we continue to deepen our knowledge of Jesus and his message of service. Each scripture of the week is shared in our fortnightly newsletter. By praying the gospel of Matthew together, we can bring the message of each scripture to our own communities, in our homes with our children so that we then speak the same language of faith, love, trust and compassion proclaimed by St Matthew.



The scripture focus for Week 10 is "The Beatitudes" (Mt 5:3-10).

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Here are a few helpful points for our reflection:

"Blessed" means happy. Happy is the person who does all these things.

Jesus does not tell us to pursue happiness; he is describing how a person is happy

Beatitude #1- "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." (5:3)

- We need to realise our utter and complete dependency on God.
- It's possible to be the richest person in the world, but be poor in spirit. And it's possible to be living in poverty, but have no need for God.
- The Jews were expecting a political kingdom and an external kingdom, which will come in due time. But Jesus teaches here that the kingdom first and foremost is an internal, spiritual kingdom.

Do you feel entitled? Do you feel like God owes you? Then you are not poor in spirit and it's impossible for you to enter the Kingdom

Have you repented, and do you continually repent?

Beatitude #2- "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." (5:4)

One of the greatest problems of the church today, and of individual Christians, is that many have never really been convicted of sin. The world has taken spiritual morphine, and numbed itself.



We see people ruining their lives with sin, and it hurts.

The Christian is comforted by the promise of God, the promise of eternal life and forgiveness of sins.

Beatitude #3- "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." (5:5)

Meek means "humble, modest, unassuming, gentle"

Meekness doesn't not mean weak, or spineless, or pathetic. It really means power under control.

When a person sees himself as a servant, he isn't frustrated that people don't recognize him, or promote him, or see his giftedness.

Beatitude #4- "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied." (5:6)

We don't hunger and thirst for happiness, we hunger and thirst for righteousness.

The person who is hungering and thirsting for righteousness is a person who has making efforts and rearranging his life to avoid sin. It is a longing to be holy. It is willing to make lifestyle changes.

Beatitude #5- "Blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy." (5:7)

Mercy means to be sympathetic, compassionate, or pitiful.

When Jesus was hanging on the cross, he said, 'Father forgive them, they don't know what they are doing."

In the story of The Good Samaritan displayed mercy on the injured man. Jesus said he had "mercy." The whole point of that story is that Jesus, is the Good Samaritan.

The opposite of showing mercy is someone who is exacting, someone who keeps records of wrongs, hold grudges, keeps mental notes of exchanges. Someone who has been shown mercy, is generous, doesn't keep a record or a mental balance sheet. They don't do mental accounting and weigh the balance.

Beatitude #6 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." (5: 8)

Jesus is concerned with the heart.

Someone with a pure heart can see God in nature, in others and in themselves.

Beatitude #7 "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God. (5: 9)

Reconciliation means someone who actively works to brings peace and reconciliation where there is hostility.

The story of the Bible is a story of God making and providing peace through His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

We called not to just keep peace, being a passively peaceful person but about being an active reconciler of people. The opposite of peacemakers: careless with words, complainers, grumblers, gossipers, trouble-makers and critics.

Beatitude #8 "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (5: 10)

Jesus is saying that opposition and persecution are a normal part of the Christian life such as name calling and belittling, physical abuse and even death.

But there is reward in heaven and we are in the company of prophets and saints.

Let us unpack the scripture using Three Senses:

Literal: What is the scripture passage saying?

Spiritual: What is the message for me & the key teaching for all of us?

Application: How can this be applied to life? (Prayer, Christian Life, Sacraments, My relationship with God?).

Thank you for joining us in our mission this year. Let us pray together as a St Agnes community, a place where we come to know Jesus.

Term 2 has been filled with many events and opportunities that highlight the St Agnes identity. A very special

occasion for St Agnes on the 2nd June was the Pentecost Liturgy at Our Lady of Consolation Chapel. We were blessed with the presence of Fr Alan Layt and Fr Jarome from the Mary's Little Children Community who celebrated a beautiful Liturgy.

Year 10 students designed our sacred space and our multicultural community was truly highlighted during the prayers of the faithful in Tagalog, Vietnamese, Tamil, Arabic and Amaric. The music students under the guidance of Miss Juarez and Mr Jadrijevic, graced us with beautiful hymns and the all beloved Christ Be Our Light song.

We thank the Our Lady of Consolation Chapel pastoral team for opening its doors to St Agnes and we look forward to the many liturgical celebrations there in the near future.




Your school team has been successful in making it through to the Western Sydney Girls Finals


Elective Photography Excursion

Getting Creative in English

This semester Year 8 have had an interesting combination of topics to study: "Myths and Legends" in Term 1 and "The Play's the Thing" this term. Both topics lend themselves to some creative input and 8B1 was definitely up to the challenge!

With the "Myths and Legends" unit, each student chose a Greek God or Goddess to study. Students presented a 2-3 minute monologue to their peers on the story, powers and idiosyncrasies of their chosen ones.

They were required to use some form of dress-up to represent their character. Athena, the Greek Goddess of Wisdom and Warfare, was a popular choice amongst the girls. Posiedon, God of the Sea and Zeus, God of the Sky and King of the Gods, were most popular with the boys. Students presented a 2-3 minute monologue to their peers on the powers and idiosyncrasies of their characters.

The "Play's the Thing" introduces students to the world of Shakespeare and Elizabethan England; giving them the context they need to take with them into Year 9 when they study a Shakespearean play in depth. We investigate the world the bard grew up in. Looking at Shakespearean English can be quite a culture shock, since our language has evolved considerably in the last 450 odd years. Many words and sayings that Shakespeare used and invented are still used today.

Shakespeare had an amazing vocabulary of over 30,000 words, which is impressive even by today's standards. Most of us have a vocabulary of around 15,000 words. Who'd have known that Shakespeare invented words like assassinate, mountaineer, radiance or luggage? Or expressions we still use today: to be cruel to be kind. In all, he is credited with adding over 2000 words to the English language.

8B1 had the informal task of building a model of "The Globe Theatre", where many of Shakespeare's plays were performed before it caught fire and burnt down. "The Globe" was so named because of its circular shape and its intent to expose its patrons to the word of theatre. Students used paper, cardboard and paddle-pop sticks to construct their models and these are now on display in our library for others to enjoy too.
